TECUMSEH'S FIRST MAYOR

OUR FIRST MAYOR 1921 to 1924 COL. PAUL POISSON M.D.; K.S.G.

There's a certain uniqueness in having the first mayor of Tecumseh help celebrate our 50th birthday. Unique in the sense that, at 84 years of age, after an entire lifetime devoted to serving people, his longevity and health still enables Dr. Paul to 'dwell amongst us' — to relive and review with nostalgia those humble beginnings. The only other living member of his council, during his third and fourth years, with whom he can share remembrances, is Mr. Edmond Drouillard, proprietor of Drouillard's Hardware.

Our first mayor was born in Belle River 1887; but he soon left the farm to pursue high-school studies in Windsor from 1900-1905 — where "the farm-boy with the high marks" immediately proceeded to take home all the trophies and hardware from the local teenagers — much to their chagrin. Apparently high-school studies weren't enough to keep this energetic young man busy; he joined the military unit in Windsor as a private in 1904 at age 17 - a "soldier" association he was to honour and cherish the rest of his life.

A vocation toward the healing arts put him on the train to London, and after four more years of intense study he graduated with honours from Western University in 1909 as a full-fledged Doctor of Medicine — the realization of another boyhood dream. We think it was while he was interning at St. Joseph Hospital in London that he met his first Waterloo — a sweet young nurse named Gertrude Connor. In the sweat and toil of establishing himself; first as an assistant in Essex, then a short term in Port Arthur with Dr. MacGready, he decided to hang a permanent M.D. shingle in Tecumseh on Oct. 16, 1910 — then he married the 'sweet young nurse' in 1911.

Another facet of his life emerged at this time — the urge to serve the community; and we see Dr. Paul sitting as a councillor for 2 years (1912–1913) in the old Township of Sandwich East. However, Kaiser Bill and his war rumblings across the sea were to delay any further political aspirations for another eight years. By this time he had advanced to Lieutenant in the Army Medical Corps, and he left Canada with the first contingent of 33 ships as Medical Officer to the Engineers. An oddity occurs here: after a training session at Folkstone England, he landed in France on Feb. 14, 1915 and left France four years later on the same day Feb. 14, 1919. We wonder if he remembered, as dutiful husbands do, to send his 'sweet young nurse' a Valentine on both occasions.

Destiny is an awesome thing. He suffered a shrapnel wound during the Courcellette campaign in 1915; but two of his men walking alongside died as a result of the same shrapnel burst. Destiny is indeed an awesome thing. Honours came to the young Doctor with a promotion from Captain to Major, and a decoration at Buckingham Palace by King George V in 1916. With hostilities over, he returned to medical practice in Tecumseh, and dug deep into the life of the community. Always a religious man, a heritage coursing through the entire Poisson family, to mention the numerous lay societies and charitable organizations to which he gave time and energies spanning a



lifetime would be superfluous. It suffices to mention only the 'topping on the cake', for the years of devotion to his faith and leadership in various religious, educational, and bilingual groups. It came in 1956 in the form of an investiture at St. Peter's Cathedral in London by Bishop Cody where he was invested with the Order of St. Gregory (K.S.G.) — one of the highest honours that can be bestowed upon a layman by the Catholic Church.

In the Windsor area, being completely fluent in both languages is a definite asset — none more so than in the political arena. Oh Yes! Dr. Paul loved a good clean fight! And in those depression years he ran into a few dandies! "When the Queen's Park bug bites — it bites good". So after his initial four years experience as First Mayor of Tecumseh, the political wings broadened and we find Dr. Paul winning the Sandwich East seat in the Ontario Legislature (1926) under the Conservative banner — then rose to Cabinet stature in 1931-1934 as Minister without portfolio.

As the years grew shorter another war became more imminent, and from 1940 to 1945 Dr. Paul turned to 'soldiering' for the last time — as President Medical Board M.D. No. 1, at Medical Headquarters Ottawa, as Officer Commanding Montreal Military Hospital. He resigned from the army in 1945 after serving 41 years — and in every rank from private to colonel. He then accepted an appointment as Registrar of Deeds for Essex County (retiring from this in 1959), and slowly began to phase out the medical practice begun back in 1909.

What an amazing diversity of careers — all oriented toward a 'desire for serving people'. Dr. Paul raised a family of 8 children — and now enjoys the unctions, ructions, and rambunctions of 36 more grandchildren, and 10 more great grandchildren. We remember with gaiety his 50th wedding anniversary at the French-Canadian Club 10 years ago, and we remember with sadness the passing of his 'sweet young nurse' a year ago last March.

We're proud to have you with us Dr. Paul. May you continue in good health, good humour, and good cheer.

TECUMSEH'S FIRST MAYOR 1921-1924 - Col. Paul Poisson M.D.K.S.G.

PAUL POISSON was born in Belle River, July 25th, 1887, son of Damase Poisson and Helene Diesbourg. He attended primary school in Belle River and completed his secondary education in 1905 at Patterson Collegiate in Windsor. He received a degree in medicine in 1909 from Western University in London. Dr. Poisson established a medical practice in Tecumseh on October 16th, 1910, a practice which endured until the late 1950's. He was appointed coroner in 1913 and chosen president of the Essex County Medical Society in 1927.

A keen interest in politics led Dr. Poisson to serve as councillor for the Township of Sandwich East in 1912-1913. In 1914, he enlisted in the military service and spent four years in France. He was awarded the Military Cross and promoted to the rank of major. Upon his return to Tecumseh, after the war, DR. POISSON renewed his involvement in the political arena. He became Tecumseh's first mayor in 1921 and held that position until 1924. In 1926, DR. POISSON was elected to the Ontario Legislature and became Minister without portfolio from 1931 until 1934.

In addition to his medical practice, DR. POISSON was involved in many

service organizations and fraternal societies, most often in .

of leadership. During the Second World War, DR. POISSON served as President of the Medical Board at headquarters in Ottawa and later as commanding officer at the Montreal Military Hospital. He resigned from the army in 1945 after serving 41 years in every rank from private to colonel. From 1945 until 1959, DR. POISSON was the Registrar of Deeds for Essex County and gradually retired from his active medical practice.

DR. POISSON was totally committed to his community and to the church. In recognition of his faith and Christian leadership, DR. POISSON was invested as a Knight of St. Gregory-K.S.G. in 1956, by Bishop Cody - the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a layman in the Catholic Church. DR. POISSON married Gertrude Connor in 1911, and together they raised a family of eight children. DR. POISSON passed away in 1982.

The Royal Canadian Legion in Tecumseh honored DR. POISSON by naming their organization the Colonel Paul Poisson Branch 261. The Town of Tecumseh recognized Dr. Paul Poisson's many achievements and years of dedicated service in the community by naming Poisson Street in his honor.










