FOCUS

The focus of the next three years for our detachment will be:

- Sexual Violence and Harassment
- Big Four Distracted Driving, Aggressive Driving, Impaired Driving, and Lack of Safety Restraint use
- Youth At-Risk
- Drug/Substance Abuse
- Human Trafficking

PRIORITIES

The OPP's action planning process ensures compliance with the Adequacy and Effectiveness of Police Services Regulation (Adequacy Standards) filed as O. Reg. 3/99 in 1999.

Through assessment, analysis and consultation, the following priorities were identified under three categories: crime, traffic and other policing. The priorities reflect provincial and regional issues. Subsequent local analysis and consultation will further identify the specific areas of focus for this region. Priorities will be addressed by effective management strategies combining engagement, education and enforcement. Operationalized within the construct of Ontario's Mobilization and Engagement Model of Community Policing the noted strategies coupled with each of our Communities unique initiatives will provide the foundation for sustainable community safety and reduce victimization.



- **2.1% increase** in Calls for Service May 2019 vs May 2018 (Lakeshore -0.4%, Kingsville +15.7%, Learnington +0.2%, Tecumseh -1.3%, Essex (M) +4.1%, Provincial Units -2.0%)
- YTD May Calls for Service are 6.5% higher in 2019 (19,031 calls) compared to 2018 (17,871)



Violent Crime⁴

A 27.4% decrease in violent crime May 2019 vs May 2018. (Lakeshore -45%, Kingsville +22%, Learnington -49%, Tecumseh +50%, Essex -18%). May 2019 Clearance Rate = 71.05%











MHRU Calls for Service¹¹





- A 124.7% increase in 911 Misdial calls YTD May 2019 (3,205) compared to 5 years ago YTD 2015 (1,346 calls)





Lakeshore	Ongoing investigations into numerous 'lock-spin' commercial break & enters in Lakeshore and Tecumseh. A possible suspect vehicle and suspects have been identified. Parallel investigation ongoing with Windsor Police Service.
	A male attended a Tecumseh business where he approached another male who was sitting in his vehicle during the lunch break. The male victim unknowingly exited his vehicle and was repeatedly assaulted causing injury. A 21 yr. old male was charged with Assault and Mischief.
Tecumseh	A business owner watching video from home, alerted officers to a commercial break & enter in progress. Officers attended and located a female matching the suspect descriptions. The female was found to be in possession of stolen property from another break & enter and believed involved in a nearby theft of side-by-side.
Various	Multiple investigations related to fatal and non-fatal overdoes throughout the county to identify those responsible for supplying the drugs.
	A 37 yr. old male was arrested and charged Assault with a Weapon related to offences against his children
Kingsville	A 75 yr. old woman was defrauded of over \$46,000 in a romance scam believing the funds were sent to a Romanian male who planned to move to Canada and marry her.
	A dangerous, high-risk Leamington male was located and arrested on warrant with the help of the Community Street Crime Unit and ROPE.
Leamington	A \$10,000 bicycle was stolen from a garage overnight. Video evidence and investigation lead to the arrest of a 36 yr. old male with a long history of property crimes.
Essex	Officers attended a heated physical domestic dispute. A 26 year old male was arrested for multiple domestic and breach offences. A bag discarded at the time of his arrest was linked to the accused and found to contain two loaded handguns, a two bags of pills and quantities of cocaine, fentanyl, and crystal meth.
	A search warrant was executed on a residence related to the report of a sexual assault. Two prohibited weapons were located and the male additionally charged.
